ABSTRACT STYLE: The abstracts should be in the following format and accompany a Submission Form

<p>1. Title - Top Line: Title bolded in capitals. Centred.</p>	<p>Program: Microsoft Word</p> <p>Paper Size: A4 paper (21x29.7cm) one side, using single line spacing</p> <p>Font: Calibri</p> <p>Font Size: 11pt</p> <p>Margins: LHS & RHS margins 3cm top & bottom margins 2.5cm Set language to English (Australian) and spell check accordingly</p> <p>Layout: <i>Paragraphs:</i> One line to be left between paragraphs and no indentation required. <i>Subheadings:</i> Calibri, bold, 11pt</p>
<p>2. Authors and affiliations 2nd line: Names of authors with presenting author underlined. Centred, 3rd line: Presenter's company / organisation. Centred.</p>	
<p>3. Introduction</p>	
<p>4. Materials and methods or case history (including any diagnostic tests / techniques and Animal Ethics Approval numbers)</p>	
<p>5. Results</p>	
<p>6. Relevance to Australian clinical equine practice</p>	
<p>A paragraph on each of the items 3 to 6 should suffice</p>	

It is the authors responsibility to ensure they do not exceed the abstract word limit set by the journal they intend to publish in.

The abstracts need to be informative, and such statements as “...results will be presented...” are unacceptable. All the information to be presented must be in the abstract. Any advertisements for commercial products must not be included; however, it is acceptable to mention registered drug names and dose rates if they are critical to the information presented. You are reminded that abstracts should not contain citations to published literature. Clinical papers that have previously been presented in Australasia or published in a peer-reviewed journal are unlikely to be considered for inclusion, and a declaration to previous presentation and/or publication must be included on the submission form.

The presentation time is 12 minutes with an additional 3 minutes for questions and discussion. The purpose of the clinical papers is to inform attendees of clinical research or case experience that they can use in their own practices, for the benefit of clients and their horses. Abstracts need to be submitted as per the EVA website no later than Friday 20th April 2018. The abstracts will be available to delegates at the Bain Fallon Memorial Lectures in time for the presentations. You will be notified by email if your abstract has been accepted. A number of prizes will be on offer by both organisations for the best presentations. A presenter can only receive one EVA prize, although they can receive an EVA prize and the ANZCVS prize. Presenter’s will gain free entry to the session but they will have to make and pay for their own travel and accommodation arrangements.
